They've created zines, organized art exhibitions, hosted go-cart and coffee shop meetups, supported causes they care about, and so much more.

In past years, we've showcased the communities that have received funding through an <u>annual post</u> published in r/reddit. This impact report aims to dive deeper, sharing more details behind the moderators and communities that make these projects happen. Each and every Community Funds project is a testament to the power of community and the magic that happens when people come together on Reddit and IRL.

These communities and their stories have inspired us to continue growing the Community Funds program and to continue fostering a Reddit that makes it easier and more fun for communities to connect over what brings them together. In 2025, we're focused on making the program available to more redditors and communities around the world. You can follow along as these projects come to life by joining r/CommunityFunds. Program impact by the numbers

After a successful pilot, the Community Funds program formally launched in April 2022, committing \$1 million in funding toward projects that spark collaboration within and across communities. Proposals are evaluated based on creativity, feasibility, and community impact. Here's a look at how Community Funds were distributed in 2024.

2024 by the numbers

- \$418,280 distributed to 37 communities for 38 projects
- Median funding amount: \$4,596
- Types of projects that received funding:
 - 19 IRL meetups
 - o 9 fundraiser matching projects
 - 6 community contests and giveaways
 - 3 projects to create content like podcasts
 - 1 sponsorship of a football club



DISTRIBUTED TO 37 COMMUNITIES FOR 38 PROJECTS IN 2024

Since the program formally launched in 2022, it has:

- Granted **\$710,392** in funding
- Supported 62 projects across 58 communities
- Supported projects and communities in countries worldwide, including the United States, the United Kingdom, Brazil, France, Australia, Canada, and Germany.
- Types of projects that received funding:
 - 22 IRL meetups
 - o 13 fundraiser matching projects
 - o 20 community contests and giveaways
 - 5 projects to create community focused content like podcasts or unique AMAs
 - o 2 sponsorships, including a racecar and a football club

Projects funded in 2024



In 2024, the Community Funds program supported projects representing a range of communities and interests. These projects were selected based on their creativity, feasibility, and how they sought to include community members.

Communities that received funding in 2024

- r/AustralianSpiders showcased their community member's artistic skills through a contest to spotlight some very photogenic arachnids
- r/nfl went to the sidelines for the 2024 Pro Bowl to create a one-of-a-kind Ask Me Anything (AMA)
 experience with football stars <u>Quinnen Williams</u> representing the AFC and <u>Dexter Lawrence</u>
 representing the NFC
- r/FreeGameFindings rewarded the creativity and eye for design of community members with a gift pack of games
- r/501st is <u>hosting a Star Wars Battle Pod</u> for their community
- **r/eurovision** produced interviews with contestants from the renowned singing competition, including questions and comments from their community members
- r/pickleball rented pickleball courts so their community members could enjoy a day of play
- r/glendale hosted a meetup at a local coffee shop
- r/CompetitiveEDH, a community dedicated to Magic:
 The Gathering, hosted an online tournament
- r/lemans used Funds to host their <u>annual trackside</u> <u>meetup</u> that coincided with the Le Mans
 24-Hour race
- r/football sponsored Redditch United Football Club and has given away jerseys and invited their community members to matches
- r/burbank went for <u>a spin at their local</u>
 go-cart racetrack
- r/bangtan <u>surprised their community with</u>
 124 gifts to people that participated in their
 7 Days of Jin

The **r/football** community is an official sponsor of Redditch United Football Club.



- **r/equestrian** received funding to work on a project featuring a series of subreddit discussions on combatting bullying and sexual exploitation in equestrian sports
- r/nintendoswitch hosted an in-person meetup and video game tournament
- **r/coventry** took 75 of their community members <u>abseiling down a local cathedral</u> and, in the process, raised over 60,000 pounds for Myton Hospices
- r/NYCmovies hosted a film screening and trivia night
- r/austin hosted an adventurous day of cycling, swimming, and food
- r/neworleans hosted <u>a meetup with food</u> and tunes
- r/editors hosted <u>a meetup in NYC for video</u>
 editing professionals and enthusiasts
- r/hermeticism hosted an in-person gathering at the Toledo Museum of Art with several speakers on hermeticism
- r/automobil met up at the Nürburgring in
 Germany for some quick laps around the track
- r/xbox hosted a <u>controller design contest</u> and then gave 40 of those controllers away to their community
- u/varsil worked with r/Ask_Lawyers and r/ runkleofthebailey to host an ExtraLife livestream in support of the Stollery Children's Hospital Foundation
- Children's Hospital Foundation
 r/VintageDigitalCameras is

 running a series of contests celebrating
 their growing community and their creativity
- r/chicagofood is <u>organizing a month of</u>
 <u>restaurant buy-outs</u> for their community of diners
- r/weihnachten celebrated 12 days of Christmas with 12 different giveaways
- And r/entrepreneur received funding for a soon-to-be-announced project

Prompts

In 2024, we launched three Community Funds prompts that inspired connection, collaboration, and making a difference in the world. The response to these prompts led to a breadth of projects ranging from fun opportunities to meet-up with community members in-person and opportunities to support causes and interests that bring communities together.

Prompt One: Environmental impact

At the end of 2023, we issued <u>an open call for environmentally focused projects</u>. We encouraged communities to submit projects aligned with their environmental awareness and preservation interests. Since then, we've received several applications that aligned with these themes and have funded the following two initiatives:

- r/AustralianSpiders hosted a photography contest for creative captures of arachnids. Visit the subreddit to see the stunning submissions and the community dialogue surrounding them.
- r/missouri raised \$18,253 for Missouri River Relief
 (including \$9,114 matching from the Community
 Funds program). The subreddit also hosted an AMA
 with the Communications Director of Missouri River
 Relief, Steve Schnarr, who answered questions
 about how to responsibly enjoy and aid in protecting
 the Missouri River.

Prompt Two: Meetups and Global Reddit Meetup Week!

In April, Reddit announced that Global Reddit Meetup Day was back, but better! This community-led movement to bring redditors together IRL relaunched, now as <u>Global Reddit Meetup Week</u>. Redditors and communities were encouraged to host in-person gatherings between June 8th-15th.



And with Community Funds in the mix, communities could also apply for funding to support these events. Here's how it went:

- Six meetups were funded and hosted during Reddit Meetup Week. These were hosted by r/austin, r/liverpool, r/glendale, r/lemans, r/burbank, and r/bangtan (online).
- Seven additional meetups were funded and hosted after Reddit Meetup Week. These were hosted by r/competitiveedh, r/nintendoswitch, r/nycmovies, r/pickleball, r/neworleans, r/editors, and r/hermeticism.

Prompt Three: Community Funds Giving

Over the initial two years of Community Funds, we received **20 proposals** to support community-led fundraising initiatives – from <u>fighting food insecurity</u> to <u>preserving the Earth's natural resources</u>. With that in mind, we launched the <u>Community Funds Giving Prompt</u> in October 2024, encouraging communities to apply for fundraiser matching. Community Funds matches up to \$20,000 USD for these initiatives and we evaluate these applications and the benefitting organizations based on several factors, including best practices, financials, and benefitting causes. Here's how it went:

- 9 fundraisers were approved for Community Funds matching through this initiative
- These communities and the organizations they raised funds for include:
 - r/hamilton benefitting the Hamilton Food Share
 - r/nintendoswitch and r/ask_lawyers benefitting
 Children's Miracle Network Hospitals
 - r/vancouver benefitting the Greater Vancouver Food Bank
 - r/unitedkingdom benefitting Shelter
 - r/lgbt benefitting The Trevor Project
 - r/unexpected benefitting Living Options Devon
 - r/missouri benefitting Missouri River Relief
 - r/mauerstrassenwetten benefitting Stiftung
 Deutsche Depressionshilfe

We also aim to expand the types of projects we fund, supporting projects that help communities on Reddit have fun and celebrate what makes them unique.
